

Weekday 13 Year 2 Psalter Week 1

The tradition that Peter was crucified upside down began with the reference to the form of his death in John chapter 21, in which Jesus told Peter, "I assure you: When you were young, you would tie your belt and walk wherever you wanted. But when you grow older, you will stretch out your hands and someone else will tie you and carry you where you don't want to go." John reported, (probably after Peter died) "He said this to signify by what kind of death he would glorify God." So the idea that Peter was crucified (stretch out your hands) came from John, but this does not include the location or the physical position of his crucifixion. Eusebius (AD 325) claimed in his Ecclesiastical History that all the apostles were martyred except for John. The evidence for some of these is very spotty, but the number, variety and quality of testimony to the martyrdom of Peter and Paul in Rome is sufficient that I think we can reasonably say that most likely this is how they died.

The early church fathers are unanimous in claiming that Peter died in Rome, by crucifixion, during the persecution of Nero in AD 64. As for crucifixion upside down, that is also testified to, but the evidence is weaker for this particular form of crucifixion. The apocryphal Acts of Peter is the earliest reference to crucifixion of Peter upside down. The earliest reference to the martyrdom of Peter comes from the letter of Clement of Rome (about AD 90). He said, in his Letter to the Corinthians, "Let us take the noble examples of our own generation. Through jealousy and envy the greatest and most just pillars of the Church were persecuted, and came even unto death... Peter, through unjust envy, endured not one or two but many labours, and at last, having delivered his testimony, departed unto the place of glory due to him." Not much there as to the means or location of his death, but that it was an execution is clearly implied. Ignatius, in his Letter to the Romans about AD 110 claimed that Peter was bishop of Rome. Irenaeus of Lyon, about AD 180, agrees that Peter served in Rome. Tertullian, about AD 195 declared "But if you are near Italy, you have Rome, where authority is at hand for us too. What a happy church that is, on which the apostles poured out their whole doctrine with their blood; where Peter had a passion like that of the Lord, where Paul was crowned with the death of John (the Baptist, ie. by being beheaded). Dionysius of Corinth, also about AD 200 "You (Pope Soter) have also, by your very admonition, brought together the planting that was made by Peter and Paul at Rome and at Corinth; for both of them alike planted in our Corinth and taught us; and both alike, teaching similarly in Italy, suffered martyrdom at the same time" When Eusebius reported the crucifixion of Peter and the beheading of Paul in Ecclestiacial History, he was simply passing along a tradition which has been the unanimous opinion of the church for two hundred years.

Tradition has it that Peter's body is contained in a crypt below St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. This is actually not all that far-fetched a claim. In fact, when the sarcophagus claimed to contain his body was studied in the 1960's (Margherita Guarducci, 1963-1968) the evidence supported that it was of a man about 60 years old who died in the first century AD. I certainly would not base my faith on this being his body, and besides, it is not clear the significance to a Christian to have the actual remains of Peter.

In conclusion, we can reasonably conclude that Peter was in fact crucified in Rome. As for his crucifixion upside down, this is much more weakly attested to in only one ancient source which is probably much less reliable than that of Clement, Ignatius, Irenaeus, Tertullian, Eusebius and many others.

Moving on

Bishop Kieran has appointed me to St John the Evangelist Parish, Horsham, which I have accepted. I take over from Fr Richard Biggerstaff who has been asked to take up a position at Oxford. My move from Caterham has been widely known for some time, so this won't come as any major surprise. Having spent 7 years amongst you, I feel it's time for me to move on and face a fresh challenge, and allow a new Parish Priest to come in to pursue in his own way, the missionary work that needs to be continued and to share in the joyful and lively spirit of this vibrant community. Hopefully much of what I achieved and established here will have a lasting effect. I know some found my approach rather testing initially, as difficult decisions had to be decisively taken i.e, the closure of St Thomas, Whyteleafe and the reduction of the number of Masses. But despite these two factors, the numbers have steadily grown along with the offertory collections, and this is borne out by the fact that our Primary School is now a two-form entry with 320 pupils enrolled. We still have huge numbers for Baptisms and Weddings, so the Parish is still growing and expanding. I leave the parish on a financially firm footing also. My successor is Fr Sean Finnegan, moving from Shoreham on the south coast. Sean is in his early 50's and will be the first native parish priest for a long time here, being born in Banstead. He was educated at St John Fisher. Some of you, I gather have been at school with him. His mother who is 90 still lives in Banstead. Fr Sean, some time ago, requested Bishop Kieran to find him a parish which would give him easier and quicker access to his mother. My requesting a move from here was providential for Sean's request to be answered. No two Priests are the same, so I ask you to bear patiently with Fr Sean as he settles in. It's very daunting for a new Priest in his first months as he tries to find himself. I think you will find, that he has not got that radical approach to changing things quickly that I had when I first arrived here in 2007. His approach will be a lot more sedate I feel, which many of you will welcome. He also enjoys his pint of beer, I'm told. My final Mass with you will be on Sunday 14th September. Fr Sean's first Mass here will be 21st September. I, like many of my predecessors will carry fond memories of my time here. I thank you most sincerely for your generous support throughout the seven years. Please keep us all in your prayers.
